Conversion to Automated Trash Collection: Single Family Homes

Single family homes will automatically receive one 64-gallon trash container and one 96-gallon recycling container after March 15, 2023, in preparation for the start of automation.

ed trash collection on April 1, 2023. One 64-gallon trash container exceeds the capacity of two 30-gallon containers. All recycling, including cardboard boxes, must fit in the 96-gallon recycling container.

Also...**If everyone in a household is over 65 years old or is handicapped**, then the property owner can request a 64-gallon recycling container in lieu of the 96-gallon container and one 32-gallon trash container in lieu of the 64-gallon container.

Those property owners that live on private roads that do not receive curbside trash collection and bring their solid waste to a public (City or State) right of way will not automatically receive the City's curbside collection containers. These include property owners on Hadley Road, Janna Way, Story Tyler Shore Road, Leighton Ave South, Haven Ave, Pendleton Beach Road, Boathouse Road, etc. On these roads Public Works does not know which property owners are bringing their containers to the public right of way. Property owners on private roads that bring their solid waste to the public street must request their containers.

Place an order for containers for use with the new (2023) automated trash collection system.



If you're able, please shovel out the fire hydrants close to your home or business. In a fire seconds count! Remember to clear a 3 foot perimeter round the hydrant, especially towards the street. Clear a wide enough perimeter around the hydrant for firefighters to work.

A common question that is asked is why do I need to clear the hydrant, won't the fire department clear the hydrant? The answer is yes, they will as soon as they can. However the fire department still has to respond to emergency calls. The City of Laconia has over 600 hydrants to clear and we could really use your help!

Laconia residents needing sand for their driveways or walkways during icy weather can get sand from our Department of Public Works.

There is a sand pile for residential use located at our DPW garage at 257 Messer Street.

Residents can get a maximum of two five-gallon pails (or the equivalent). Please do not take sand from our facility on Bisson Avenue; it is for City use only to maintain our streets and sidewalks.



Our yesterdays

THEN ...

The so-called 'Gen. Knight' House, at the corner of Main and Court streets, was a landmark there until 75 years ago, when the house and barn (barely visible, at right, behind the house) were sold in late 1947, to Leon E. Spears, 'provided that he move the buildings and erect apartments therein,' on Rowe Court. Knight's military title came from his appointment as quartermaster general on Gov. Busiel's ceremonial military staff. He otherwise never served in any military capacity. (Laconia Historical and Museum Society)



... AND NOW

The 'Gen. Knight House' had been located on the corner, behind the white truck seen at center, above. Spears moved the buildings to Rowe Court in late June 1948 and the corner lot remained vacant for the next quarter of a century — with an informal pedestrian path worn diagonally across it from Main to Court streets — until it became part of the parking lot for a Ramada Inn in 1974. Plans to erect a two- or three-story business block on the property were never executed. On Rowe Court, the 'Gen Knight' House, later became the office for Labbe Oil Co. in addition to apartments. It was torn down to make way for the Walgreens Pharmacy, which opened, Oct. 9, 2009. (Jon Decker/The Laconia Daily Sun)

Cooking & nutrition class, participants will receive groceries each week to practice their cooking skills. 
This year's celebration will include a month-long exhibit in the Belknap Art Gallery of local artists sharing their original creations



REMINDER:
**Dumping Snow into
Waterbodies is Prohibited**



Snow cleared from roads and parking lots contains debris, trash, sand, salt and other contaminates that are harmful to water quality.

While snow can be stored by surface waters at least 25 feet from the high water mark, it should NEVER be dumped into waterbodies.

Due to the contaminates and debris snow contains, dumping snow into waterbodies without a permit is illegal. RSA 485-A:13, I(a) prohibits discharging wastes to surface waters without a permit.



Prevention Is Better Than Reaction



Temperatures have been moderately warm for this time of the year but do not let this warm spell fool you and make you believe that pipes are not capable of freezing.

Temperatures are falling below freezing at nights which would allow for the pipes to freeze. As always be cautious and double check that all the pipes are properly protected.

If the temperature inside a house gets below 32 degree Fahrenheit (0 degree Celsius) it's likely that the water supply pipes and the drain traps will freeze. When water freezes it expands 9 percent, and if there is no room for expansion it's possible that the pipe will develop a crack and eventually leak once the ice thaws out. Fixing a ruptured pipe can be expensive, but the damage from uncontrolled water leakage can easily reach into the thousands of dollars.



The majority of the calls received for frozen water pipes and water meters are a result of inadequate heating and cold air drafts where piping is located in the home. It is recommended that property owners check their property for these conditions and identify the location of their water meter and shutoff valve before an emergency.

The property owner is ultimately responsible for repairs to the piping within the home or building. The Water Department can replace frozen or damaged meters.

Customers will be charged for the cost of the replacement of the meter and service calls, as applicable. Your plumber can also replace a frozen meter.

If for any reason you cannot stop the flow of water from a frozen or broken pipe, call the Water Department's 24-hour emergency number at 603-524-0907.
