

Evening Nonfiction Book Group: “The Barbizon: The Hotel That Set Women Free” by Paulina Bren



Women flocked to New York City during the Roaring Twenties. Even as women's residential hotels became the fashion, the Barbizon stood out; it was designed for young women with artistic aspirations. More importantly, with no men allowed beyond the lobby, the Barbizon signaled respectability, a place where a young woman of a certain class could feel at home. The Barbizon Hotel became the go-to destination for any young American woman with a dream. Famous residents included, Sylvia Plath, Titanic survivor Molly Brown, Grace Kelly, Joan Didion, and more. The first ever history of this extraordinary hotel, and of the women who arrived in New York City alone from “elsewhere” with a suitcase and a dream, The Barbizon offers readers a multilayered history of the generations of American women torn between their desire for independence and their looming social expiration date.





In the fall of 2007, Jende can hardly believe his luck when he lands a job as a chauffeur for Clark Edwards, a senior executive at Lehman Brothers. Clark demands punctuality, discretion, and loyalty—and Jende is eager to please. Clark's wife, Cindy, even offers Neni temporary work at the Edwardses' summer home in the Hamptons. With these opportunities, Jende and Neni can at last gain a foothold in America and imagine a brighter future. However, the world of great power and privilege conceals troubling secrets, and soon Jende and Neni notice cracks in their employers' façades.*

When the financial world is rocked by the collapse of Lehman Brothers, the Jongas are desperate to keep Jende's job—even as their marriage threatens to fall apart. As all four lives are dramatically upended, Jende and Neni are forced to make an impossible choice.

Becoming Wolf: The Eastern Coyote in the Northeast

Myths surrounding the coyote cloud our understanding of it. Learn the true story of the Eastern Coyote - how it lives among us but is rarely seen and how it contributes to keeping our forests healthy. This coyote differs from the western coyote in genetics and behavior but has the same superior resilience and adaptability. It has rewilded the northeast with its howl and challenges us to live with and appreciate this small wolf in our presence.

Despite the ecological benefits the coyote brings, it is the most persecuted carnivore in North America. And despite human efforts to eradicate it, it survives and thrives among us.

Chris Schadler, M.S., Conservation Biology, will discuss coexistence strategies, whether you farm, hike or garden. Chris has 40 years of experience in wolf and coyote research, sheep farming, and teaching.

This series, co-hosted by New Hampshire Alliance for End of Life Options, and the Laconia Public Library will focus on the profound to the practical, helping to demystify and normalize conversations about mortality, death, and what really matters in our lives. The series covers how to think about and communicate our end of life wishes – a process that evolves over time as our lives change. Attend in person at the Laconia Public Library! Free and open to all.



Would we really want to live forever? The world's great thinkers have answered consistently and emphatically, no! The knowledge of our own mortality sharpens our focus on living. Without death, they argue, life itself could become meaningless.

But there are other ways to live forever - through those around us, who witness and learn from us. How we approach aging, illness, and end of life can teach and leave our loved ones with a sense of wholeness, hope, forgiveness, and love. These are deep experiences that can pass through generations. So you can live forever – no cryogenics needed!

However, this definition of living forever means taking death out of the closet. By really absorbing its truth, we can sharpen our quality of living.

In "How to Live Forever" we'll start by examining and clarifying our own thoughts, values, and beliefs around how we face the end, and through that, how we can live life to its fullest. It's the first step toward good conversations with those who matter most about some of life's most profound questions, including how we approach our dying.

"How to Live Forever" will be held in two sessions – attend one or both! Session One, on Wednesday March 6, focuses on the question: how we would live if we really knew we were going to die? We will challenge ourselves to bring this awareness into our daily lives. It's the foundation for conversations with those who matter most – our loved ones, health care proxy, medical providers, clergy, and others – about how we want to approach our end.


Writing Group






