How to check out books for your book club

Have you been thinking about starting a book club? The library can help!

If you are not sure what book you would like to read, try a Reads-to-Go kit! A Reads-to-Go kit includes fifteen paperback copies of a book along with discussion questions to ask during your book club. You can reserve kits ahead of time to make certain they will be available for your group. To browse titles on Reads-to-Go, type www.eventkeeper.com/kitkeeper/index.cfm?curOrg=NHLA into your internet browser. Once you have selected a title, call us to request the kit for you.



If none of the titles on the Reads-to-Go list strike your fancy, the library may be able inter-library loan (ILL) copies of your selected title. Whatever you choose, please make sure that the title has been out for at least six months. They likely will not come in all at once, it's possible that the library may not be able to get enough copies, and due dates will vary. The patron requesting will also be financially responsible for the copies in the event of loss or damage.

If you would like to see how many libraries in the state have a copy of your selected title, you can search the state catalog at www.nhais.shareit.com to make an informed decision about whether to ILL your chosen title.

Talking About Death Won't Kill You... and May Help You Live More Joyfully Session 2: Whom Do You Trust With Your Life? Who's Trusting You with Theirs?



NH Alliance for End-of-Life Options presents the profound and the practical, helping to demystify and normalize conversations about mortality, death, and what matters in our lives. The series covers how to think about and communicate our end-of-life wishes, a process that evolves as our lives change.



Session two will focus on the medical power of attorney, also called a health care proxy: the person we legally appoint to speak for us when we can't speak for ourselves. We'll consider choosing one for ourselves and what it means to be a proxy for others. Through facilitated discussion, we'll consider the treatments available, considering questions like quality of life versus longevity, what gives us joy, our concerns and our aspirations, and where we might compromise. Choosing the right proxy may be the most important decision you'll make in completing your advance directive, the legal document that spells out medical preferences if you cannot speak for yourself.

Author Talk: Ordinary Families



Retired U.S. diplomat David K. Wessel will be reading from his new novel, "Choosing Sides", and speaking on the subject of 'Ordinary Germans' and how they dealt with the rising tyranny of Hitler's takeover of their country. Wessel's book tells the story of his father and grandparents, an ordinary family caught in the maelstrom of Nazi Germany, and the choices they faced. David K. Wessel relies not only on his family story but 50 years of studying how the Weimar Republic shaped the lives of 'Ordinary Germans'. He majored in history (Rutgers University) with a focus on Germany between the wars.



Wessel is a member of the American Historical Association, Association for Diplomatic Studies and Training, Historical Novel Writers Association, National Council for History Education, and New Hampshire Writers Project. This program will be held in the library auditorium on Thursday, April 11 at 6pm. No sign-up is required, books will be available for purchase and signing.



April 7-13 is National Library Week

In 1894 the City of Laconia received a bequest from Napoleon Bonaparte Gale, a prominent Laconia citizen, to erect a public library and park. Boston architect Charles Brigham was awarded the design job and the building contract was awarded to E. Noyes & company of Boston, MA.



The Gale Memorial Library opened to the public in June 1903. The building, created in the Romanesque Revival style, constructed of New Brunswick red granite and Deer Island gray granite, with carved woodwork and stained glass, is a masterpiece of art and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

In the summer of 2004 a beautiful new 9,000 square foot addition, designed by J. Stewart Roberts & Associates Inc. of Somerville, MA, was built and the original Gale building was renovated and restored. The new 18,000 square foot Laconia Public Library was completed in fall of 2005.
