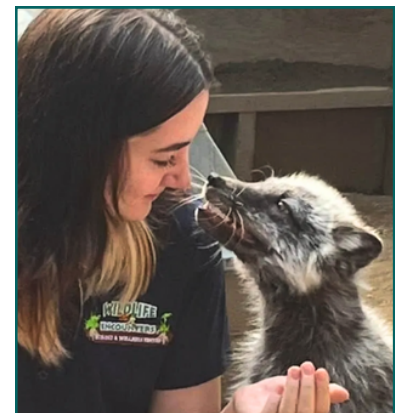

RECIPE CORNER

From “Lemonade with Zest” by April White – find it upstairs at 641.3 Whi!

4 organic lemons

2 organic navel oranges

1 cup granulated sugar

6 cups still water

1 tsp orange blossom water

1. Wash and juice the citrus. Cut the shells into eighths. In a

bowl, muddle the peels lightly with the sugar. Add the juice and marinate for about 2 hours at room temperature, covered with a clean kitchen towel. Stir occasionally to ensure all the sugar is dissolved.

2. Strain through a fine-mesh sieve. Press on the peels to release more liquid.

3. In the pitcher, stir together the lemon–orange mixture, water, and orange blossom water. Refrigerate until cold. Serve straight up.

OUTSIDE LOOKING IN WITH MIKE ROGERS

Blind songwriter, guitarist and poet Mike Rogers presents scenes and characters in his life of seventy-five years. He has been on the road from coast to coast, New England, and the Caribbean.

This show is laced with Mike's wry humor and paints portraits of people "outside the circle" in song, storytelling, and poetry. Sometimes edgy, sometimes gentle, his characters are all real people from his journey through life and he places emphasis on understanding and accepting others. Mike accompanies himself on his guitar and his signature harmonica. His comfort with his audience comes from 15 years of teaching high school as well as the music business. He has been performing for over 45 years and has recorded on more than 40 albums. He has opened for Emmy Lou Harris, Tom Rush, The Eagles, James Montgomery, and others. Mike and his wife, Beverly, represented Maine and Georgia at the 1999 International Very Special Arts Conference in Los Angeles and his folk group, Salt River, represented Maine at the New England Artists Conference in 2000.

The other two members of the Mike Rogers Trio are Mike's wife Beverly, who adds harmony vocals, and his long-time friend and bandmate Dan MacLellan on bass and harmony vocals.



SONGS OF EMIGRATION STORYTELLING THROUGH TRADITIONAL IRISH MUSIC

Through traditional music, Jordan Tirrell-Wysocki relays some of the adventures, misadventures, and emotions experienced by Irish emigrants.

The focus is on songs about leaving Ireland, sometimes focusing on the reasons for leaving (a man who is driven from his land by English persecution), revealing what sometimes happened upon arrival (an immigrant drafted into the Union army during the Civil War), and exploring the universal feeling of homesickness of a stranger in a strange land. Jordan Tirrell-Wysocki discusses the historical context of these songs, interspersing their stories with tunes from Ireland that made their way into New England's musical repertoire, played on his fiddle or guitar. Jordan Tirrell-Wysocki is an award-winning fiddler/singer.

This program is made possible by a grant from NH Humanities, and is free and open to the public.

EVENING NONFICTION BOOK GROUP "THE OUTERMOST HOUSE" BY HENRY BESTON

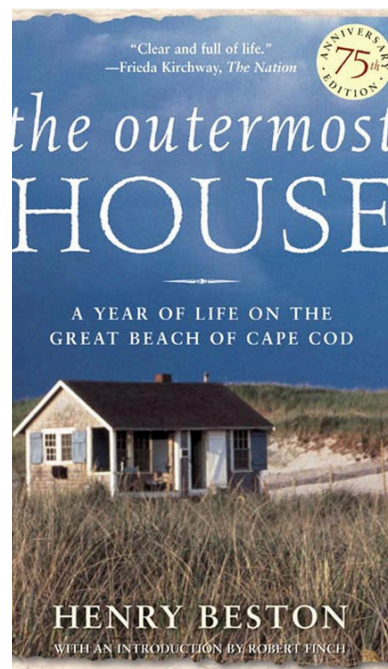

MYSTERY BOOK CLUB "CROCODILE ON THE SANDBANK" BY ELIZABETH PETERS

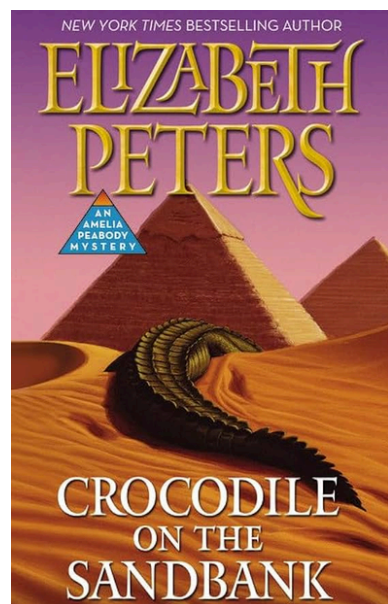

What's in a name?

- August was named after a major figure of the ancient Roman world, *Augustus Caesar* (63 B.C. – A.D. 14). He was the first Roman emperor (though he never claimed the title) and grandnephew of the previous ruler Julius Caesar (who named July after himself)!
- Before it was renamed, this month was previously known as *Sextilius* (sixth month) by the ancient Romans. It only became the eighth month around 700BC; being rudely shoved back in the order when January and February were added by King Numa Pompilius.
- The Anglo-Saxons referred to August as *Weod Monath*, or "weed month" – for how swiftly late-summer weeds grow!

Interesting!

- August was a fateful month for the ancient Roman city of Pompeii. On August 24, 79AD, Mount Vesuvius erupted near the city. The mountain spewed out great clouds of ash, smoke, and pumice, which rained down on Pompeii's citizens. Unfortunately for Pompeii, that wasn't the end of it either – next came molten lava, which buried the remaining residents 7 feet (2.1 m) deep!
