
The story follows an iron worker named Sawyer as he ventures into the White Mountains to bring his beloved Carrigain a precious diamond.

APPLE BUTTER

From "Full Moon Suppers" - find it upstairs at **641.564 AHE!**

- 4lbs soft apples (Braeburn, Cortland, or McIntosh)
- 2-3 tbs lemon juice (based on apple tartness)
- 2 cups water
- ½ cup sugar per cup of apple pulp
- 1 cinnamon stick

Core the apples, chop them up into large chunks, and toss them into a large bowl with the lemon juice. There is no need to peel them, as the peel contains a thickening agent that will be useful. Place the apple chunks in a large pot with the water. Bring to a boil, reduce to a simmer, and cook until the apples are tender, about 20 minutes. Strain the apples, discarding the liquid.

With a spoon, push the apples through a sieve. Measure out the pulp: for every cup, you will use 1/2 cup sugar. Combine apple pulp and sugar in a medium, thick-bottomed pot and toss in a cinnamon stick. Cook over low to medium-low heat for 1 to 2 hours, until the apple butter is thick (it will be spreadable once it cools).

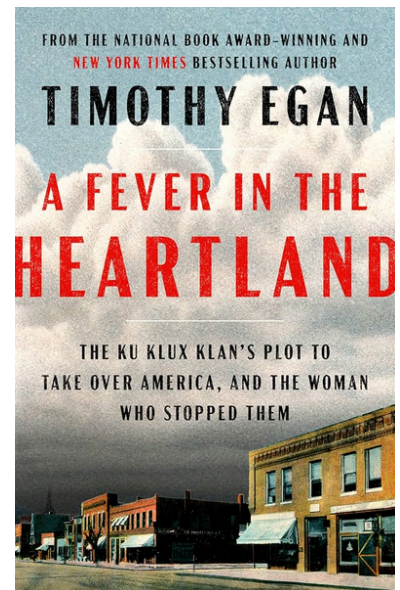
EVENING NONFICTION BOOK GROUP "A FEVER IN THE HEARTLAND"

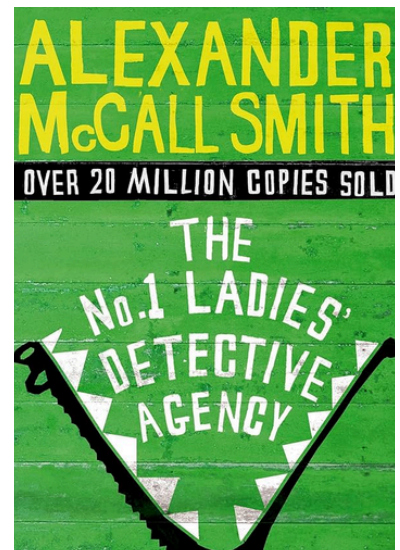
MYSTERY BOOK CLUB "THE NO. 1 LADIES' DETECTIVE AGENCY"

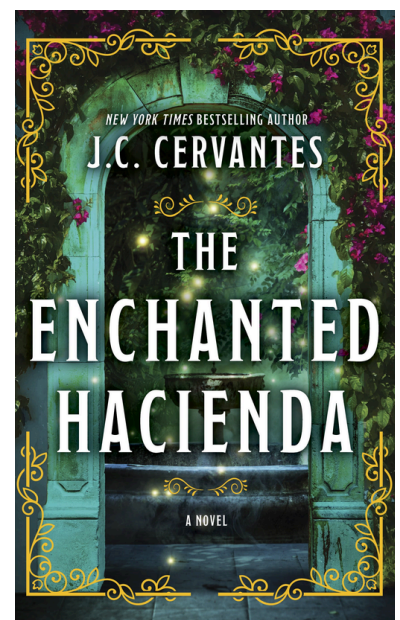
FANTASTIC FICTION BOOK GROUP "THE ENCHANTED HACIENDA"

What's in a name?

- October, derived from the Latin word for "eight", was the eighth month of the original Roman 10-month calendar! It was bumped back to the tenth month with the addition of January and February in 713BC.
- The Saxons called this time of year "Wyn Monath", which translated into "wine month" because it was the time of the year for making wine.
- The Anglo-Saxons called it "Winterfylleth", combining the words for *winter* and *full moon*, because winter was said to begin from the first full moon of the month.


Notable October
