Laconia Area Community Land Trust Saves 65 units of Affordable Housing

Laconia Area Community Land Trust (LACLT) recently completed a 65 unit preservation project purchasing 40 units in Ashland and 25 units in Meredith. Originally developed with Rural Development USDA financing, the affordability for the Meredith units was due to expire now and the Ashland units in a few years. By creatively consolidating the two properties, LACLT was able to save the imminently expiring 25 units as well as preserve the other 40 units as permanently affordable.



The housing was originally developed by the late Dave Hodges Sr. of the Hodges Companies. The company wanted to honor his legacy and commitment to affordable housing and approached LACLT to do so. LACLT was among the first in the nation to work with Rural Development to creatively purchase, refinance, and renew the subsidy and affordability of these expiring projects. "We're grateful to the Hodges Companies who could have easily put them on the market and sold to the highest bidder - and to Rural Development who went the extra mile to make this successful" said LACLT founding Executive Director Linda Harvey.



In honor of Harvey the properties have been renamed Harvey Heights. She states, "Saving decent affordable housing means saving a critical community asset. I was very surprised and honored to learn that the LACLT staff and Board chose this name for the properties. Affordable housing is an integral part of any community's healthy housing mix, ensuring diversity, opportunity, and a labor force for essential community services."

LACLT will seek financing for rehab and upgrades to the 65 units. Upgrades will include new energy efficient heating systems, replacement of windows to improve building envelope, replacement of roofs, on-site recycling, and many others.

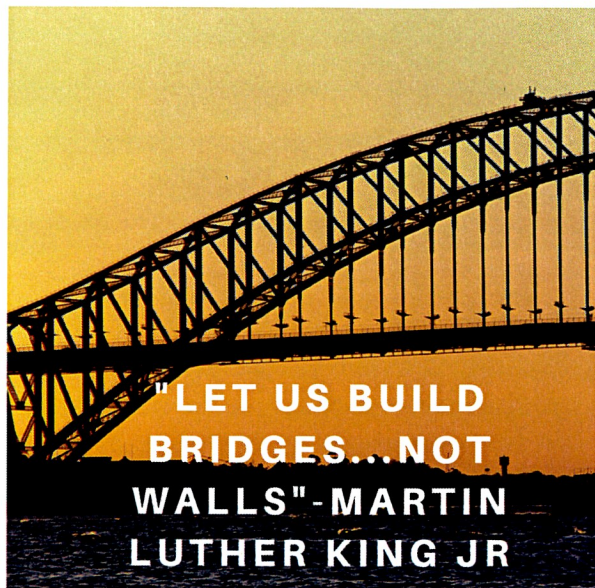

Laconia Fire Department ended 2016 as the busiest year for emergency work. There were 4,622 emergency calls. This is an increase of 7% over last year and 40% since 2010.

There were just under 7,000 apparatus responses to these emergencies. 72% of the calls required a single unit response. 10% required a full shift response. 18% required 2 units, such as an ambulance and fire engine. These 2 unit responses are usually high-risk medical emergencies, or motor vehicle crashes.

In the built-up areas of the City we maintained a response time within 6 minutes at 89%, which is very good. In the more rural areas we maintained a response time within 6 minutes at 63%. One of the reasons we maintain a good response time is that 68% of all our calls are in the built-up area of the city.

There were 25 serious/major emergencies during the year. Multiple or overlapping calls continue to be a major problem. There were 2,280 times that we had more than one call working. It is not uncommon to respond to two or three calls within a short period of time.

The busiest months in order were June, August, July (which is expected), and then November, September, and May (which is unusual).

The three ambulances that we operate had a total of 3,959 responses. These units respond to medical calls and fire calls. Our primary ambulance had 3,110 responses. This unit is very likely one of the busiest ambulances in the State. The average firefighter on-duty responded to 513 emergencies, which very likely makes them the busiest of the top 15 cities in the State.

The calls by day of week are consistently equal at 13% to 15% for each day. 45% of the calls are during the daytime; 37% are early evening; 18% are after 11PM. There is no quiet day in Laconia.

In addition to the 13 emergency calls that the firefighters respond to each day they must check their equipment daily, clean their stations daily, train daily, conduct inspections almost every day, and shovel hydrants during the winter months. Our firefighters are very dedicated and committed to providing the best possible service to the residents and visitors of Laconia. They are well-trained, highly motivated, and very adaptable. It is not uncommon to see firefighters going from one unit to another to handle the various calls. Many days you'll see a fire truck respond back to the fire station and the two firefighters jump out of that truck and get into an ambulance, and vice versa.

We are very fortunate to have these hard-working men and women protecting this great City!
