"Join the New Hampshire Clique" Seat Belt Campaign

The Laconia Police Department with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration will be conducting an aggressive, statewide campaign during daylight hours May 1st – June 30th to enforce the state's child passenger safety law and encourage all motor vehicle operators and passengers to use seat belts. Drivers will also be educated about the lifesaving value of child safety seats and seats belts.

RSA 265:107-a Child Passenger Restraints Required.

No person shall drive a motor vehicle on any way while carrying as a passenger a person less than 18 years of age unless such person is wearing a seat belt or safety belt which is properly adjusted and fastened. No person who is less than 18 years of age shall drive a motor vehicle on any way unless such person is wearing a seat or safety belt which is properly adjusted and fastened. No person shall drive a motor vehicle on any way while carrying as a passenger a person less than 6 years of age unless such passenger is properly fastened and secured by a child restraint system which is in accordance with the safety standards approved by the U.S. Department of Transportation in 49 C.F.R. section 571.213. If the passenger is 55 inches or more in height, the provisions of this paragraph shall not apply.

While the primary emphasis will be placed on child passenger safety, adherence to all traffic laws will be monitored and enforced.

The Great Sheep Boom and Its Enduring Legacy on the New Hampshire Landscape

On Thursday, April 26th at 7pm in Laconia Rotary Hall the Library will host the lecture "The Great Sheep Boom and its Enduring Legacy on the New Hampshire Landscape". In a brief 30-year period in the early 19th century, the New Hampshire countryside became home to hundreds of thousands of sheep. Production of wool became a lucrative business, generating fortunes and providing the only era of true agricultural prosperity in the State's history. It left behind a legacy of fine architecture and thousands of miles of rugged stonewalls. Farmers overcame enormous challenges to make sheep husbandry succeed, but forces from beyond NH were to doom the industry with social consequences that would last a century. Presenter Steve Taylor, independent scholar, farmer, journalist and longtime public official, will speak on this all but forgotten period in the State's history. This program is graciously sponsored by the Laconia Public Library and the NH Humanities Council.

Fire Danger from an historical perspective.....



Very few Laconia residents remember the significance of May 26, 1903, but firefighters do, even though they only hear stories about that day. It was early afternoon and a fire started in Wood's Mill just below the Lakeport Dam. The fire spread throughout the Mill and then started spreading to adjoining buildings. By the time the fire was under control early that evening, 200 families, 500 people, were homeless. 108 homes were destroyed; several mills, two churches, the power company, and a fire station were all destroyed. The fire stopped just before what is now the Elm Street School. There were no more homes and the land flattened out. There was no more fuel to burn.

The fire spread rapidly. And that is the reason for the historical perspective. The weather conditions in May of 1903 were very similar to the conditions we are experiencing right now. There had been very little rain and the temperatures were unseasonably warm. The day of the fire winds were out of the southwest at about 15 to 20 miles per hour.

The fire service and weather service now issue fire danger warnings. We have had a dozen red flag warnings since the end of March. On April 17th of this year the winds were between 15 and 20 miles per hour. The relative humidity currently is very low as is the dew point. Everything has been drying out, not just the brush and forests. Firefighters look at things differently than the average person. You see a beautiful forest.....we see fuel. You see a nice clapboarded home.....we see fuel. If it is combustible, it is fuel. Today everything that can burn is very dry. The winds will push a fire quickly from house to house. The high temperatures and sun are actually preheating the fuel. There are no leaves on the trees to absorb heat, block the sun, or slow down the winds. The dry air and wind is pulling moisture out of all fuels.



Laconia is always at risk of fire. We are a city of mostly wood buildings and they are very close together. Our homes are built on sloping terrain, which stacks house one above the other. Today and for the next few weeks, or until we get several inches of rain, we are at a very high risk of a major fire that could easily consume several buildings. In some areas our homes are literally on top of each other. Unless buildings are separated by more than 30 feet they are subject to fire spread, especially in these conditions.

So heed the warnings. Be extra careful with any fire. Do not burn brush until the conditions have improved. If you see a fire or smoke or suspect a fire, call 911. Let the Fire Department check it out. We do not have time to spare when fighting fires. We do not want history to repeat itself.



Conservation Commission News

**2012 Earth Day
April 28th**



Over the past year, the Laconia Conservation Commission, working cooperatively with Waste Management Industries and Laconia Public Works Department, created an all-inclusive Earth Day event to be held at the Laconia Transfer Station. The goal of the project is to enhance wildlife habitat while identifying, isolating and properly removing invasive species. Last year's goal of bringing bluebirds back to the site was achieved thanks to the assistance of local Boy Scouts and a small group of volunteers who helped construct and install bluebird boxes.

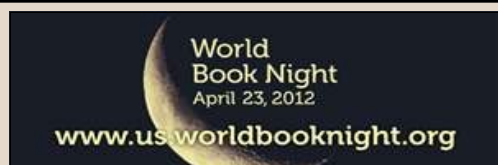
The 2012 Earth Day project on Saturday April 28 will focus on enhancing bluebird habitat by planting native vegetation to support the bluebirds and other existing wildlife. The Belknap County Conservation District will supply us with master gardener recommended native vegetation to be planted by local Middle School students and other volunteers. Belknap Landscape Company, Inc. will assist by monitoring the planting process. A later project will remove previously identified invasive species on the site.



Oriental Bittersweet

If you come across invasive species in your yard enhancements or landscaping, please follow these simple guidelines to dispose of them: First, call the Conservation Commission at 527-1264 and/or the State Invasive Species Coordinator, Doug Cygan, at 271-3488 for general removal instructions. Second, call the Laconia Public Works Department at 528-6379 to set up a time to transport the materials to the Hilliard Road brush facility so that local personnel can properly dispose of the materials.

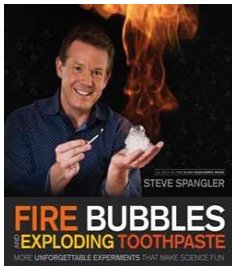
