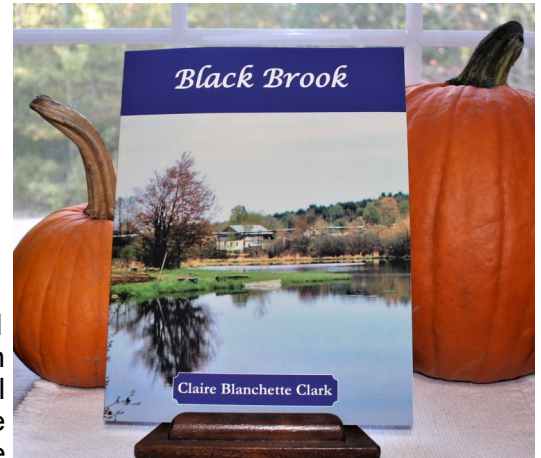


'Black Brook' book sells out, second printing ordered

The first 50 copies of Claire Clark's new book, "Black Brook: A Historical View of the Northerly Section of Lakeport, New Hampshire," sold out within two weeks, the Laconia Historical and Museum Society reports. A second printing has been ordered and copies should arrive within a day or two.



Consisting of 168 pages in 8-1/2 x 11 format, soft bound, illustrated with more than 120 photographs, 20 in full color, the book was written by Claire Blanchette Clark, who grew up in the Black Brook section and has done extensive research on this part of Lakeport.



Among other features explored are the Squire Clark ("Hathaway") House, Tekwood, the Shore Diner, Rudzinski icehouses and Blaisdell Avenue — along with the people who lived and worked there. Many of the photos have never appeared in print before.

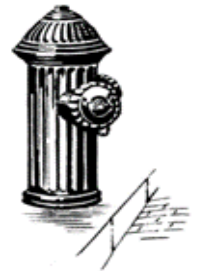

SURVEY OF TRASH AND RECYCLING CONTAINERS

The City of Laconia, as part of its efforts to improve the quality of life in the City and to control the growth of costs associated with disposing of solid waste, is considering converting from a manual collection system to an automated collection system.

An automated collection system has a single operator in the truck and the operator uses a mechanical arm to empty the containers. This option can reduce the City's curbside collection costs and is safer for the workers who collect solid waste.

All solid waste containers must be compatible with the plan for this type of collection system. The plan includes the City providing City owned trash and recycling containers to residents and business that are on public highways and meet the criteria for curbside collection under City ordinances.

Approximately 7 years ago the City was selling recycling containers with "Laconia Recycles" stamped on the container as part of its effort to enhance curbside recycling in the City. The stamped imprint on the cans let the driver know that recycling was in those containers. These cans are compatible with automated collection systems.



Many residents and business may have bought trash containers that are also compatible with these systems. A picture of a compatible can is shown (left).



As part of the planning process Public Works is asking those residents and businesses in the City who still have these cans, or similar cans, to let the City know that they have them. Your reply will help the City determine how many cans it needs to buy allowing us to continue the planning process.

To make it easy for residents and business to reply, the City has created a page on its web site to collect your responses. The website will collect addresses but not names. Your reply will enable the City to determine the cost of conversion to an automated system. Your replies will also enable the

City to develop its plans for delivering cans in the City if the City Council decides to convert to an automated system.

THEN . . .

The Aldrich Studio ('a complete line of photographic equipment and supplies') opened, 75 years ago this week in 1945, in the former F.R. Adams' West End Grocery and Provision Store, 154-156 Elm St., corner of Bayside Court, Lakeport, seen here in the early 1900s, at the west end of the Elm Street Bridge. Immediately to the left is a gatehouse on top of the Lakeport Dam. Building with stair tower in distance beyond it is the Bayside Mill, which burned in 1905. The other large factory building at left center in distance is the Halifax Mill, which was razed in 1966. Flanders & Kelly grocery store (later, Demers) is the building at extreme left. . . . AND NOW

The Aldrich Studio building was razed in connection with construction, in 2001-2003, of a new Elm Street Bridge, one bridge width south of its predecessor. In fact, none of the buildings in the earlier view still exist, with the exception of the Metz building (then, the Tetley Box Shop) which was glimpsed at far left in that photo, and the Opera House Block in the distance at left. As part of the City's effort to improve the quality of life in the City, Public Works has been enforcing the City's [Solid Waste Ordinance](#).

Following are some of the issues that have resulted in violation notices and fines. The first violation results in a warning. The second violation results in a minimum of a \$250 fine.

Residents and businesses are putting solid waste containers in the right of way too early and leaving them out too late.

Solid waste containers can only be placed out for collection after 7:00 pm the day before your scheduled collection day, and they must be removed from the right of way no later than 7:00 pm on your day of collection.

Bulky Items are put in the right of way too early for collection.

Bulky items are like solid waste containers. They can only be placed out for collection after 7:00 pm the day before your scheduled collection day and they must be removed from the right of way no later than 7:00 pm on your day of collection.

Bulky items do not have stickers on them.

The contractor will only collect bulky items if they have a City bulky item sticker on them. Many residents hope that someone will take the item for free leaving the item on the street too long, thus resulting in a violation notice.

Trash bags are on the ground.

The contractor will only collect trash if it is in a container. They will not collect loose bags that are on the ground.

Trash cans are overflowing.

The contractor has been instructed to follow what the City calls the "Iceberg Rule". If most of the bag is below the level of the rim of the trash container, the contractor will collect it. Otherwise, the bag will be left by the contractor and placed on the ground.

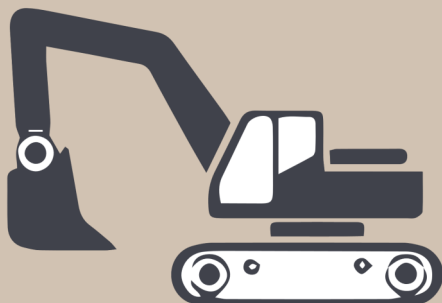
Yard waste (leaves and grass clippings) are put out too early.

The City only collects yard waste at the curb 4 weeks each year. Two weeks are in the spring and two are in the fall. Yard waste can only be put in the right of way after 7:00 pm the day before your scheduled collection day. Laconia residents can bring yard waste to the Transfer Station; commercial establishments cannot. Please ensure your yard waste does not include any invasive species as the yard waste is composted and it can spread these species into other areas.

Digging/Excavation in the City's Right-of-Way Fees Are Increasing



Starting December 1st, the permit fee for Digging/Excavation in the City's right-of-way will be increased.

The Administrative/Inspection Fee is increasing from \$75 to \$125.

The City has instituted a street damage charge. This charge is assessed at \$5.00 per square foot of excavation occurring within the paved portions of the public right-of-way or on City property.

An infrastructure damage charge of \$2.50 per square foot of excavation will be charged for excavation occurring within the unpaved sidewalk areas of the public right-of-way or on unpaved portions of City property.

Streets that have been paved within the last five years are considered under moratorium and work on these streets is permissible only under certain circumstances.

If an excavation occurs in a street where the pavement is less than 2 years old, the street damage charge is multiplied by three (3).

If an excavation occurs in a street where the pavement is 2 years to 5 years old, the street damage charge is multiplied by two (2).

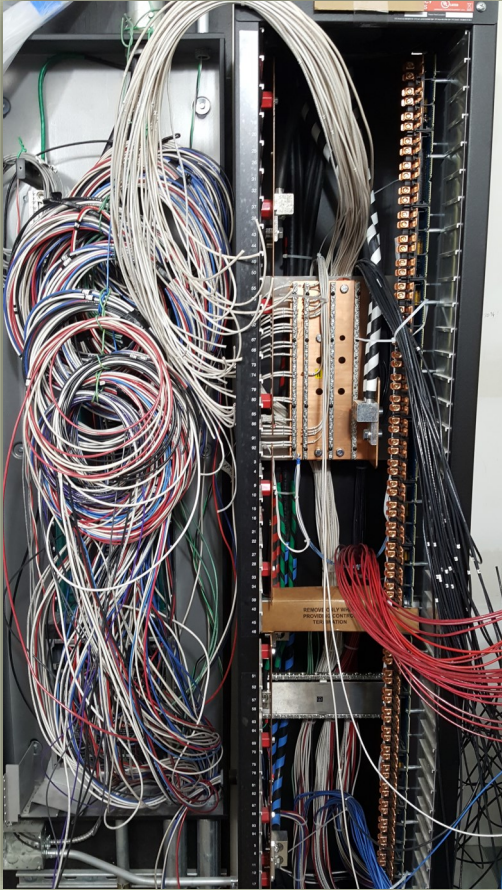

Gilford Hannaford Helps Support Lakes Region Scholarship Foundation Through Their “Hannaford Helps-Reusable Bag Program”

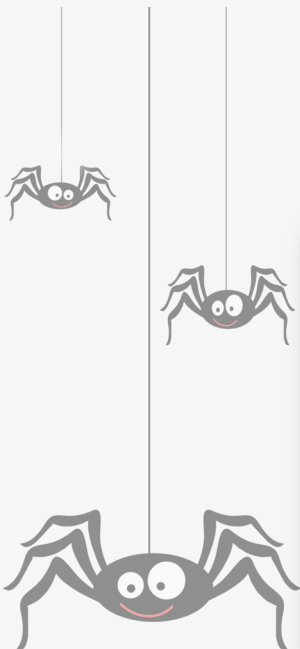

Resident of the Month



Ralph Higgins, 68, a Laconia NH native and Vietnam War Veteran has been named "Resident of the Month at Sunrise Residential Living.

Ralph served in Vietnam from 1966-1970 on a Navy ship. He was transferred to Vietnam to a TP boat. The original name of the boat was Higgins boat, named by his grandfather. These boats carried machine guns that never stopped firing, and they could turn around fast. Ralph worked on plastic explosive devices.

Ralph remembers eating food from his helmet while being in Vietnam. In 1970 he came back home to Laconia, NH and married his wife. He started working at Allen Rogers, staying there for 8 years, then moved on to the shoe repair shop in

downtown Laconia. Ralph also worked at Lakes Region Construction for 20 years before settling down to work at a restaurant in Laconia, subsequently retiring at age 62 after a back injury.

Ralph was born in Laconia NH. He has 15 brothers and sisters and has been a resident of Sunrise Towers for 8 years. He spends most of his time working on the electric wiring on his power chair that he bought a year ago. Ralph has decorated his power chair with American flags and many bright and shiny colors so he is easily seen by the public eye. His chair is a work and progress and he hopes to have it all working and up and running by spring.
