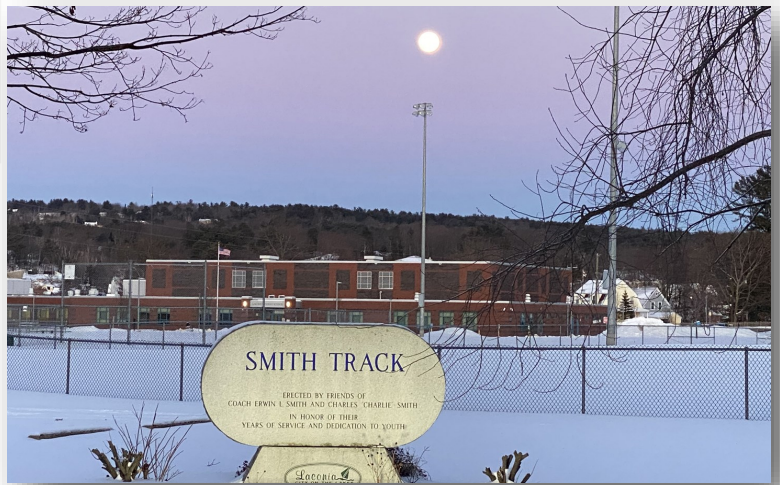




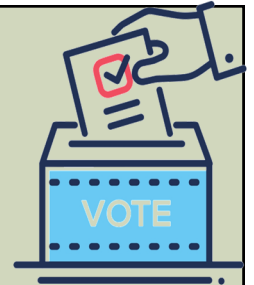

Rights for someone (or an organization) to cross another person's property

This is a complicated topic as there are many different ways for someone or an organization to have a right to cross another's property. This article will focus on two of the most common situations in the City.

Crossing over another's property:

A right for another person to cross your property is most commonly created by a private right of way, a right to pass and repass, or an easement. All three versions are fairly common in the City. Most of the time the right to cross another's property is in your or their deed.

Some common situations found in the City are:

- A property that is "landlocked" by other properties such that they do not have access to a public street will have some form of a right to cross a property to get to the public street.
- Two properties that share a driveway, enabling the property owners to get to garages behind the houses.
- A private road that enables property owners to gain access to their property.

Utility Easements:

Utility easements give a utility company the right for a utility, such as an electric line, to go through a person's land. The easement could be for any utility or just a specific utility.

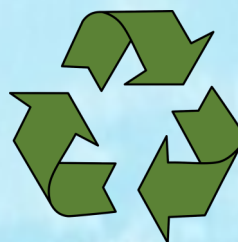
Some common situations found in the City are:

- Utility easements for Eversource's regional electrical distribution system.
- Water, sewer and drainage easements with the City
- Water, sewer and drainage easements to enable a property owner to install underground utilities to the City's system or to a lake or stream in the case of a drainage system.

If you have a question about a City utility easement please call Public Works at 528-6379. If you have questions on someone's right to cross over your property, you should talk with your attorney.

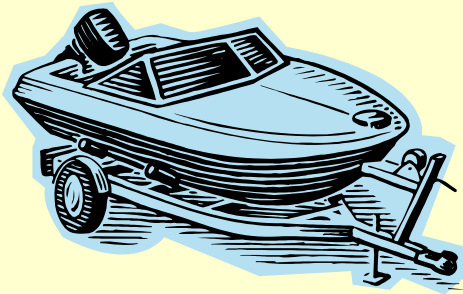

It's Not Too Early to Get Your 2021 Boat Registration!



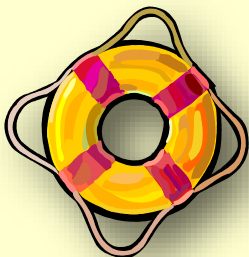
Did you know you can process your boat registration at the same time as you conduct other business at City Hall?

SOLAR ASSISTANCE FOR NH SMALL BUSINESSES

– A LIVE WEBINAR –
FEBRUARY 24TH - 2 PM



Curious if your NH small business has the perfect roof for a solar array and how utilizing solar energy can help your bottom line? New Hampshire Rural Renewables (NHRR) and the USDA Rural Development REAP programs are here to provide the answers to your questions. Join New Hampshire Rural Renewables and USDA for an hour-long webinar on February 24th at 2 pm. Sandra Jones and Andy Duncan with NHRR, and USDA Rural Development's Ken Yearman will detail how your small business can receive no-cost technical assistance, how to access financial incentives such as a USDA REAP grant, and the tangible steps to get you there.

The February 24th webinar will cover how NH businesses qualify for NHRR's no-cost, vendor-neutral technical assistance and how NH small businesses can access incentives to fund over 50% of their solar project costs. The presentation will also feature how a central NH farm leveraged a USDA grant and other incentives to reach their solar goals.

Andy Duncan, from Lakes Region Community College, will explain NH Rural Renewables' vendor-neutral technical assistance services. "Small businesses located in 80% of New Hampshire's geographic area are eligible for our no-cost services," says Mr. Duncan, "to assist with reducing their energy costs through solar energy, modern wood heat and energy efficiency." Sandra Jones, Director of the Plymouth Area Renewable Energy Initiative, will feature a central NH farm that NHRR recently assisted with the process of picking a site, selecting a solar installer, obtaining financial incentives and bringing a solar array on-line. "We understand that business owners are busy running their businesses, our technical assistance is designed to make exploring and installing solar energy easier and less time consuming." The webinar will conclude with USDA Rural Development Energy Coordinator Ken Yearman providing tips for successful applications to the Rural Energy for America Program (REAP) grant program, which can provide up to 25% towards renewable and energy efficiency project costs.

The 2021 Tree, Shrub, Flower and Trout Sale is here! This annual sale is a fundraiser for the Belknap County Conservation District (BCCD) and your purchases help support local conservation efforts here in Belknap County. This year we are offering strawberry plants, blueberry bushes, raspberry canes, nut tree seedlings, fruit trees, fruit bearing ground cover plants, evergreens, flower bulbs and potted plants, asparagus, onion, shallots, plants for wildlife food and shelter, live trout, and more!! Please visit the BCCD website at www.belknapccd.org on the home page to see the plant description and order forms. Most plants are offered as bare root in a dormant state, meaning they are not in soil and require immediate planting.

BCCD recommends customers order their plants by March 1st; however, orders will be accepted after the deadline while supplies last. The deadline for trout orders is April 23rd. The plants and live trout will be ready for pickup during the first weekend in May. Rainbow and Brook Trout come in 6-8" or 10-12". These disease-free fish are hatchery grown and cannot be released into free-flowing streams or public waterways. In the days before World War I, when sleighs, pungs, barges and other vehicles on runners were used during the winter, this was a common sight on streets and highways. The heavy rollers compacted the snow to provide a firm surface for the runners. Because of the weight of the rollers, a six-horse hitch like this was required. Close inspection discloses at least four people riding on the roller. The photo was taken in front of 70 Academy St., at the corner of Hoyt Court, in Laconia.
