Damage to Solid Waste Containers

The solid waste and recycling containers provided by the City are warrantied for 10 years. The City will repair or replace the containers damaged through fair wear and tear. Please call Public Works (603-528-6379) to begin the process of having the containers repaired or replaced if necessary.

When you call, please identify the type and size of the container and provide a description of the damage so that Public Works can bring out the materials necessary to repair/replace the container.

For example;

- A 65-gallon trash can had one of its wheels fall off the container.
- A 35-gallon trash container had one of its wheels break and the wheel is in pieces.
- A 95-gallon recycling container has a broken hinge and the lid will not stay on.

Public Works will take the actions necessary to have the manufacturer provide the City with a replacement container or the parts used to repair the container and will put the replacements back into City stock.

Parking at Weirs Beach!

Please note that parking is now being enforced in Weirs Beach at the two public parking locations:
Lakeside Avenue and Endicott Rock Park.

The City uses kiosks and a “pay by space” system in both locations. Visitors must pay to park between the hours of 9:00 am and 10:00 pm at either location. Please note that the kiosks accept only coins or credit/debit cards.

There are five-hour, three-hour and two-hour parking spaces available on Lakeside Avenue. Parking at these spaces costs \$2.00 per hour.

Endicott Rock Park parking lot has no time limits; it costs \$2.50 per hour to park there. If you have a Laconia Resident Beach sticker on your vehicle, you will not have to pay to park at the Endicott Rock Park parking lot, but you will have to pay for parking at the kiosks on Lakeside Avenue.

Assessing Property Tax Credit Forms

DP-8 forms are now available in the Assessing Office in City Hall. Please feel free to stop by to pick up a form, or call the Assessing office at 603-527-1268. The deadline for filing the form is June 30. You can also fill out the form by clicking [here](#).

This form applies to Low/Moderate income homeowner's property tax credit. This program is offered by the State and refunds the State education tax portion of the tax rate to qualifying property owners.

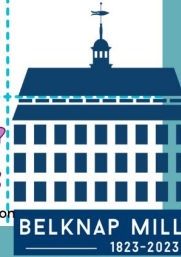

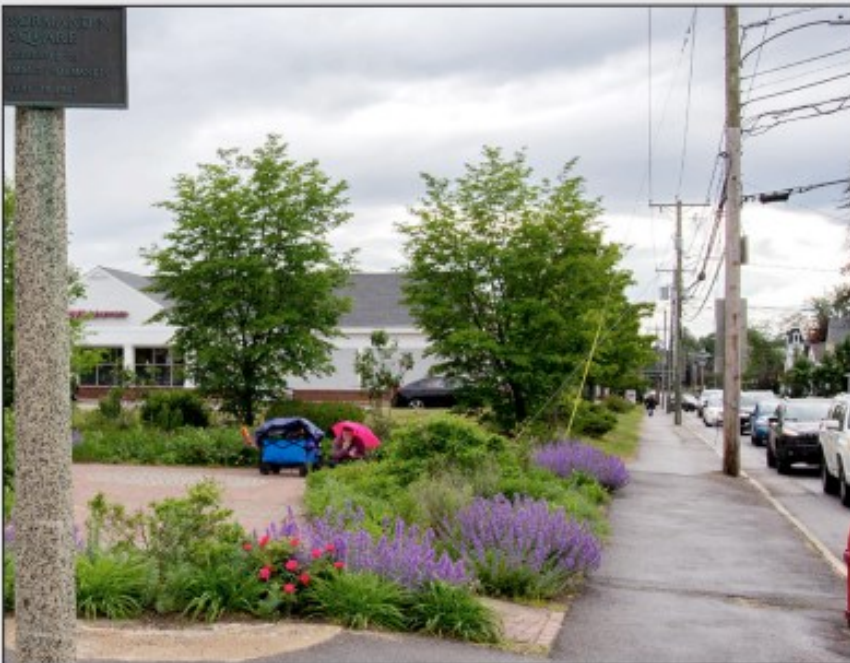

THEN ...

The iconic Busy Corner Store, at the intersection of Union Avenue and Church Street, Laconia, is seen in the early 1940s, with an apartment building behind it at 230-234 Union Ave. and the Simoneau & Son Funeral Home glimpsed beyond the store, on the Church Street side. In June 1998 — 25 years ago this week — Alan and Shelly Marcoux had purchased the store from Bill and Molly Holman, who had ceased operations in the fall. 'We want to bring back some of the old feel,' Shelly said of their plans to set up a deli and soda fountain inside the store. (Laconia Historical and Museum Society)



... AND NOW

The Marcoux continued in business until mid-August 2001. Later occupants of the store included the law office of Peter Brunette and JD's barber shop. The apartment building on Union Avenue burned, Dec. 5, 2003, making two dozen people homeless. The funeral home, later known as Simoneau-Paquette, merged with Wilkinson-Beane in 2009 and the building was demolished in March of that year. CVS then built a pharmacy on the lot, later that year. 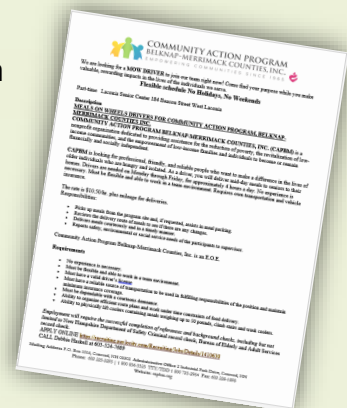

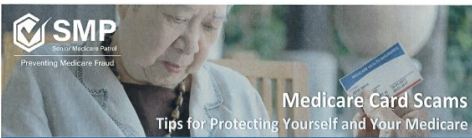

MEDICARE FRAUD PREVENTION WEEK!

Please click on the images below to read important information from the Senior Medicare Patrol regarding Medicare Card Scams, Medical Identity Theft, and How to Lower your Prescription Drug Costs:



In 2018, Medicare updated the Medicare card from containing a person's Social Security number to a random identifier that includes numbers and letters. That was the last time the card was updated and there is no plan to update it again.

What Does the Card Look Like?

- The card from Medicare is a paper card that has a blue banner on the top, a white middle, and a red banner on the bottom. However, you can print your own in black and white.

Examples of Medicare Card Scams

- Someone calls you claiming:
 - You are getting a new, plastic Medicare card.
 - Medicare is switching to a card with chip in it.
 - It's a new year so you need a new card.
 - You need a black and white card.
 - They need your Medicare number to see if you have received your new one yet.
 - They need you to verify your Medicare number so they can confirm you have the correct Medicare card.



What Can You Do to Stop New Medicare Card Scams?

- Do not answer calls from numbers you do not recognize.
- Do not confirm your Medicare number or answer "yes" to any question.
- Guard your Medicare card and number like a credit card! Don't share your number, laminate it, make copies, or let anyone else make a copy.

How Can Your Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) Help?

Your local SMP is ready to provide you with the information you need to **PROTECT** yourself from Medicare fraud, errors, and abuse; **DETECT** potential fraud, errors, and abuse; and **REPORT** your concerns. SMPs and their trained teams help educate and empower Medicare beneficiaries in the fight against health care fraud. Your SMP can help you with your questions, concerns, or complaints about potential fraud and abuse issues. It also can provide information and educational presentations.

Medical identity (ID) theft occurs when someone steals personal information – such as your name and Medicare number (this also includes any Medicare Advantage, Medigap or supplemental, prescription drug, or other health ID numbers) – and uses the information to bill your insurance for supplies or services you did not receive. Typical examples are medical treatment, medical equipment, prescription drugs, and surgery. Not only can this affect your finances, but this can also endanger your care.

When you fall prey to consumer scams and give out your Medicare number, your Medicare number is considered to be "compromised" as a result of your medical identity theft. If this happens, it is recommended to request a new Medicare number from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) by calling 1-800 Medicare to prevent any further abuse.

When to Contact Your Local Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP)

- You gave out your Medicare number:
 - Over the phone or internet to someone offering genetic testing, coronavirus testing or supplies, back or knee braces, etc.
 - At a fair or other gathering as a check-in or to receive "free" services
 - In response to a television or radio commercial, postcard, or Facebook/print ad
 - To receive more information or to sign in at a Medicare Open Enrollment event
 - To someone offering to deliver milk or other groceries to you
 - To someone claiming Medicare will cover housekeeping services
- You were contacted by your doctor to cancel appointments since, unbeknownst to you, you were signed up for hospice care.
- You received boxes of braces, testing kits, or other medical supplies in the mail that you did not request.
- You were contacted by a debt collection company for a provider bill you do not owe.
- Your Medicare and/or Medicare Advantage plan denies or limits your coverage or benefits because of a medical condition you do not have or says you already received a product or service when you did not.



How to Lower your Prescription Drug Costs

Cost-saving checklist:

- Apply for Extra Help**
 - You may qualify if you have limited income and assets. See the following page for details.
- Learn about any State Pharmaceutical Assistance Programs (SPAPs) in your state**
 - Call your local State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) to find out whether your state has an SPAP. If you are eligible, and how to apply. Call 877-839-2675 (and say "Medicare" when prompted) or go to www.shiphelp.org to contact your SHIP.
- Talk to your doctor**
 - Ask your doctor if a generic drug could work for you. Generic drugs are often less expensive than brand-name drugs.
 - Ask your doctor if they can provide you with samples of your medication. This is only a temporary solution.
 - Ask your doctor for assistance with appealing. If your drug is not covered or is covered on a high cost-sharing tier, you may be able to appeal.
- Learn about any Patient Assistance Programs (PAPs) that could help you**
 - Some drug manufacturers offer PAPs. Your doctor may have to apply for you, and eligibility varies based on the program.
- Ask your pharmacist to waive your copay**
 - While they are not allowed to do so routinely, your pharmacist may be able to waive copays on a case-by-case basis.
- Look for charity programs that help pay drug costs**
