When crushed or damaged, Li-ion batteries can cause fires resulting in property damage, injury or death.

Li-ion battery fires are extremely difficult to put out!



BATTERY MANAGEMENT

NEVER put Li-ion batteries in the trash or curbside recycling bin. **RECYCLE** them through a battery collection program.

DON'T TRASH RECHARGEABLE BATTERIES – IT'S THE LAW!

Effective July 1, 2025, rechargeable Li-ion batteries are prohibited from disposal in New Hampshire landfills and incinerators.
(RSA 149-M:27, II)

The disposal ban requires **everyone** to recycle their Li-ion batteries.




Vapes/e-cigarettes?

WHERE TO RECYCLE YOUR LI-ION BATTERIES

Many New Hampshire municipalities and businesses have collection boxes for recycling rechargeable batteries.
